## Letter from the Manse

<sup>20</sup>Where is the wise person? Where is the teacher of the law? Where is the philosopher of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? <sup>21</sup>For since in the wisdom of God the world through its wisdom did not know him, God was pleased through the foolishness of what was preached to save those who believe. <sup>22</sup>Jews demand signs and Greeks look for wisdom, <sup>23</sup>but we preach Christ crucified: a stumbling-block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, <sup>24</sup>but to those whom God has called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. <sup>25</sup>For the foolishness of God is wiser than human wisdom, and the weakness of God is stronger than human strength. (1<sup>st</sup> Corinthians 1 NIVUK)

I continue to be struck by how counter-intuitive our faith is, at least by worldly standards.

Last month, I reflected on God's call to "Be Still" and know Him: that the way for us to better know our Heavenly Father is not to push ourselves into ever greater busyness for our faith, but rather is to slow down and allow Him to work in our lives. In essence: less is more.

In the passage above, Paul further explores how our faith is counter-intuitive. The main issue to the Jews and Greeks is this - how can you proclaim a risen Saviour, if He died? That encapsulates the worldly perspective; everything dies and dead things stay dead. Indeed, death is rarely seen as a victory, and is often considered the ultimate defeat. Those enemies of Christ who saw Him die upon the cross celebrated: they thought they'd won!

Yet, the LORD proves that His ways are not the world's ways, and that He so often works in a way which is counter-intuitive to us. I could list so many examples; for now, let me stick with this one - that through death came new life. Death was not a defeat, it was a victory; the death of God on the Cross was not Him losing, it was Him winning! The Cross achieved salvation for all who believed, and gave way to new life in the Resurrection. Indeed, it would be fair to say that the Resurrection can only happen if first there is death.

We who follow Jesus know this; yet, we confess that we still struggle - precisely because it is counter-intuitive. It is hard to believe that good can come from bad, that new life can come from death, because we are surrounded by a world which tells us this is folly. Yet the Truth of our LORD stands firm: death gives way to new life; but to get new life, you first must die.

From this, I begin thinking about the Presbytery Mission Plan.

I think it is fair to say that, for the longest time, the Church of Scotland has been pursuing a policy of self-preservation (at every level, by the way - Nationally, and locally!). The irony is that, as the Church has poured ever more resource into this attempt at self-preservation, the faster the decline. These efforts have been wholly self-defeating, despite the wisdom of the world (which would say the more effort you put into preservation, the more likely it will save).

Can the LORD resurrect our denomination? Of course, He can! But (and you all know what I'm about to write here), before resurrection, there must be death. What that death and resurrection will look like, I do not know. But I am convinced that we all must be willing to embrace, first, death in order that we might enjoy the new life to come.

Now that is counter-intuitive. It may also be painful. But the one who calls us to this counter-intuitive embrace of death is also the one who promises that, through Him, we WILL receive new life. In essence, it's a call to trust Him.

Do you trust Him?

## Glasgow Presbytery Plan & Local Clusters

I won't revisit the detailed information that Stuart gave to all of us in last month's Informer, but I can update you with progress and future plans. As you know I have taken part in a number of discussions with our neighbouring churches during March and April, starting with Langside, Shawlands, Newlands etc. and latterly with Cathcart Trinity, Cathcart Old, and Queen's Park Govanhill. We have formally agreed a cluster with the last 3 churches and this proposal came to a special meeting of Glasgow Presbytery on 3<sup>rd</sup> May for approval. So what happens next? Well it's all new territory for all 4 churches. We have 6 facilitated meetings to attend, with 4 representatives from each church. At these meetings we have to produce a "Mission Plan" for the cluster as a whole, for the next 5 to 10 years. It must be a plan for growth, for re-connecting to the people of our parishes and a plan that encourages people to return to a faith in God and Jesus Christ. I don't minimise the enormity of the problem, because during my lifetime as an elder we have not managed to accomplish that. We have come close a few times, but we need to knuckle down and bury rivalries between churches and work together building on each other's strengths. These meetings will take place during May and June and I hope and pray that at the end of that time we have a clearer picture to share with you all, and may the Holy Spirit guide us and his presence known in all of this.

## Congregational Annual Stated Meeting

What's that I hear you say? As we haven't had such a meeting for 3 years due to Covid restrictions! We have set aside the morning of Saturday 18<sup>th</sup> June for the Congregational Meeting between 10.00 am and 12 noon. We will present the 2021 Annual Accounts and we will share the very latest information we have concerning the "cluster" discussions mentioned above. As I have said before it's a time of concern for all of us, but not a time of worry; God has plans for each and every one of us, and it's His plans we need to sign up to. God bless.
