¹³Now all has been heard; here is the conclusion of the matter: fear God and keep his commandments, for this is the duty of all mankind. ¹⁴For God will bring every deed into judgment, including every hidden thing, whether it is good or evil. (Ecclesiastes 12 NIVUK)

I really enjoy the book of Ecclesiastes. It has a kind of bleak outlook which just appeals to my sense of humour. From the opening lines of, "²'Meaningless! Meaningless!' says the Teacher. 'Utterly meaningless! Everything is meaningless.'" (Ecclesiastes 1 NIVUK) through to the conclusion quoted above, I find some enjoyment from this gloomy exploration of reality and the human condition.

I think my appreciation goes deeper than just finding humour in the bleakness (I should explain, this stems from my opinion that it is always better to look at the darkness and laugh, than look at it and despair). I appreciate the writer's honesty throughout the book. He seeks to find meaning and fulfilment in life; he seeks wisdom and Truth. In the end, he arrives at the conclusion that the purpose of any of our lives is to "fear God and keep His commandments". It is possible this is what the Reformers had in mind when writing the Westminster Shorter Catechism, with the famous question and answer:

Q: What is the chief end of man?

A: Man's chief end is to glorify God and enjoy him forever.

All this speaks to our need for fulfilment; our need for purpose; our need to feel that we are somehow living worthwhile lives and doing worthwhile things. The trouble we face is that we often seek fulfilment and purpose in things which are liable to change. Suppose you seek purpose in your job, but are made redundant: your purpose is lost. Suppose you seek fulfilment by being part of a particular institution, but that institution folds: your need for fulfilment is unmet. This can lead to despair, sadness, feelings of failure.

This problem extends into Church. We seek our sense of purpose, fulfilment, in things other than God. We seek fulfilment by identifying with a particular fellowship, congregation, or denomination. We seek purpose in the *things* we do in Church - activities, tasks, or events. What happens, then, when a congregation closes, an activity stops, or the desired outcome of an event is not achieved? The same result as above: a purpose lost, fulfilment unmet, feelings of despair, sadness, failure.

What should our purpose be? Where should we find fulfilment? By seeking to glorify God and enjoy Him forever. We struggle to do that because sin tempts us to glorify things other than God. That is why we need Jesus Christ: through His death and resurrection, we are brought back to God; by the gift of the Holy Spirit, we are gradually shaped and empowered to seek God's glory as our highest priority.

In seeking this, we are granted joy and freedom. Joy because we know we are accepted by God thanks to Jesus, not our efforts. That means we can never be failures in God's eyes. He will delight in us as, with the Spirit's help, we seek to glorify Him in all that we say and do. Knowing we have God's guaranteed delight brings us joy.

Freedom because our we are no longer bound by thinking God is judging us by our performance. We are judged through Jesus Christ; therefore, we are judged to be forgiven and accepted by Him. Nothing I do can affect this, so now I am free to live glorifying God to the best of my ability, knowing that no matter what I do, I am always His.

All the rest, the writer concludes, is up to God. He will judge all things. All I need be concerned about is living to glorify Him and enjoying Him forever. If I can do that, to the best of my ability under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, that is all that matters; all else is secondary.

Why do I share all this? Because, as has been shared before, and will become apparent; we are in for a tumultuous time thanks to Presbytery Mission Planning (to say nothing of the situation in the wider world). Glasgow Presbytery Plan & Local Clusters

Our final facilitated meeting between representatives of the 4 churches took place on 24th August and I'm pleased to say that we agreed on a final draft of our Presbytery Mission Plan cluster document which has been sent off to Glasgow Presbytery. The plan is for 5 years (2023-2027) and will see the 4 congregations working together in 2 pairs with us working more closely with Queen's Park Govanhill and the 2 Cathcart churches doing likewise. This means an increase in workload for both incumbent ministers as they gradually get to know the other congregation and begin their journey of team ministry. It also gives office bearers and members of all churches an opportunity to get to know each other better and share resources together. I'll give you more information later once we know the Glasgow Presbytery plan is approved and our small part in this is accepted.

Warm Banks

This is probably a term many of us don't recognise, but it is becoming known to more and more people. We all face challenging times ahead with energy costs and general inflation. So try and provide some help, we are looking at how we could make the church available to people throughout the week during the winter months, giving folk a place they could drop into for warmth and maybe a cup of tea or coffee or even soup and a sandwich. 
Help Required
