Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and for ever. (Hebrews 13:8 NIVUK)

As 2023 began, a YouTuber, whom I follow on Twitter, shared the following thought:

"Ok, I know 2020 was a disaster, and 2021 was a disaster, and 2022 was a disaster, BUT THIS TIME- " (<u>https://bit.ly/3iciDmo</u>)

This is someone I follow for entertainment. As far as I am aware, they have no religious outlook nor faith. Their main purpose for being on both YouTube and Twitter is entertainment. Hence the tongue-in-cheek manner of the tweet.

Yet, something about this stood out to me. While meant for comedy, it is true that the last 3 years have, in various ways, been disasters. First the pandemic which brought all manner of restrictions, anxieties, and concerns. As that eased, we then found ourselves in a fuel crisis, a cost of living crisis, political crises; all in front of the general backdrop of the Climate Crisis and goodness knows how many other global concerns. And this is to say nothing of the ongoing crisis in our denomination.

The point of the joke (and I realise that explaining a joke often robs it of its humour, but hey ho...) is that it is nonsensical to suggest, based on the evidence of the last 3 years, that somehow this time round, we'll get it right. That things will improve. That, somehow, all will be well this year.

What has been highlighted in this tweet, albeit in a humorous way, is the reality that we cannot know the future. It is folly to suggest that somehow this year, "things can only get better" when we cannot know what will happen to us even a few seconds into the future! Indeed, one of my wife's pet peeves is when I boldly assert, "it will be fine!"; when the reality is that I do not and cannot know if "it" will be even remotely "fine"!

Happy new year...!

I realise this is a bleak opener. But that is the point. What I have shared above is reality, from a worldly perspective. If you live your life apart from God, this is the best you can get. And it is important I point this out to you, for 2 reasons:

- 1. To help you better understand the perspective of your friends and neighbours who do not know God, that you might be able to relate to their situation, and minister to them accordingly;
- 2. To enable you to better appreciate what we have, with God. It is often the case that we are better able to appreciate what we have when we consider what life would be like without "it", whatever that may be.

Now, you know me - I do not approve of taking a single verse of Scripture, removing it from its context in the Bible, and giving it meaning. Doing so leaves us open to arriving at all sorts of wild conclusions. Hebrews 13:8, however, is likely the exception to this rule. While it flows as part of the chapter, it can still stand alone, and powerfully so.

When faced with an unknowable future, and surrounded by crises which continue from years past, what hope do we have? We have Jesus. Our salvation, made possible through His death and resurrection, is our hope. The love which motivated Jesus to do this for us remains constant. And, because He is the same yesterday, today, and forever, what we have in Him will always be there for us and will not change. That is our hope.

I do not know what this year will bring. But what I do know, and what gives me certainty and hope, is this: Jesus Christ is the same, yesterday, today, and forever!


