## Letter from the Manse

<sup>7</sup>The path of the righteous is level; you, the Upright One, make the way of the righteous smooth. <sup>8</sup>Yes, Lord, walking in the way of your laws, we wait for you; your name and renown are the desire of our hearts. <sup>9</sup>My soul yearns for you in the night; in the morning my spirit longs for you. When your judgments come upon the earth, the people of the world learn righteousness. (Isaiah 26 NIVUK)

Waiting. There is a stereotype that we in the UK are adept at waiting (well, at least queuing). Whether true or not, this is very much in contrast to the prevailing culture of the day, which seeks instant gratification: everything from fast food to binge watching programmes on the latest streaming service. There is an expectation that we get what we want now.

Before we fall down the rabbit hole of blaming current generations for their lack of patience or inability to delay gratification; I must point out that this reality has been a part of human experience for most of our existence. Yes, our culture may be shaped by this desire for instant gratification more than previously, but it is too simplistic to think of this as a modern-day phenomenon. Impatience runs deep in the human race, and has been a mark of our dealings with one another and with the world for a long, long time.

Consistently in Scripture, human impatience is presented as a negative force in the world. Whether it is Abraham sleeping with his wife's servant, Saul consulting a medium before battle, or Judas agreeing to betray Jesus: each demonstrates a lack of faith in God, not trusting Him to act; so taking matters into their own hands, seeking a particular outcome; but in their impatience, and impertinent acting, causing pain, misery, even death.

Advent is a time of expectant waiting. It is a time to encourage us to reflect on God calling us to wait on Him: to trust that His plans are in motion, and will be brought to fruition at the right time. Rather than trying to preempt God's plans, or circumvent them with out own agenda, we are to trust and wait.

That is the encouragement from the part of the prophecy of Isaiah, quoted above. What are the righteous of God to do while we wait on Him? Simple - we walk in the ways of His laws. What were the People of God to do while waiting for Him to enact His plan of salvation? Wait, and walk in the ways of His laws. What are we, the People of God, to do today, while we wait for Him to establish the reality of His Kingdom? Wait, and walk in the ways of His laws.

We walk in the ways of His laws not to earn God's favour - that is impossible. Rather, we do this as a grateful response to what God has already done for us through the complete and perfect work of Jesus, through whom we are saved. In walking the ways of His laws, we are declaring our allegiance to Christ, who saves us, and representing Him and His ways to our world, all to the glory of God. Our living may not necessarily save anyone; but walking in the ways of His law at least make us useful should the Spirit need us to be part of the building of God's Kingdom in this world.

As another year approaches its close, and we look ahead to a year of further uncertainty, with the contents of the Presbytery Mission Plan being implemented, we may ask, "what are we to do while we wait upon the Lord to enact His plans for us?". Simple – while walking in the ways of His laws, we wait for Him.

## Presbytery Mission Plan Update

I wanted to add a brief note to highlight something many of you may already have heard. Recently, our friends in Cathcart Old Parish Church made the brave, but difficult, decision to give up their building, thereby accelerating the process of union between their congregation and Cathcart Trinity Church; with Cathcart Trinity's building being the designated place of worship for the united congregation. While some procedures still need to be followed, it does seem that the move to union will happen far faster than was originally anticipated in our plan.

This does not materially change anything in our part of the mission cluster; but it is important we keep in mind what is happening with our neighbours and do what we can to prayerfully and practically support them, especially as the situation for them moves far more quickly than was initially anticipated.

- Supported Housing Service /Fife Housing Support /Bethany Homes empowering independent living.
- Care Van feeding the homeless in Glasgow, Perth and Edinburgh.
- Anne Hope House therapeutic residential community for females coming out of homelessness.
- Upstream a therapeutic, befriending and counselling service within secondary schools.
